The Diocese of Fresno Respect Life efforts culminate in Bishop Steinbock's 4:15 pm Respect Life Mass to be celebrated on Saturday, January 16, 2010 at St. John's Cathedral. Family Life Ministries is organizing a Family Life Faire from 1pm-3:30pm in Msgr. F.X. Singleton Hall that day, prior to the Mass. Family Life organizations, such as Natural Family Planning, Catholic Engaged Encounter, Fresno Catholic Singles, Marriage Encounter, Beginning Experience, Retrouvaille, and Rachel's Vineyard are encouraged to register for a table at the Faire with Sr. Joanne. Parishes are encouraged to invite their parishioners to "come and see" the organizations that support Family Life in this Diocese.

"Every Child Brings Us God's Smile" was the theme of this year's Respect Life Sunday, celebrated on October 4, 2009. In August I directed the USCCB Pro-Life Office (www.usccb.org/prolife) to send each parish in our Diocese a Respect Life Program Packet, with a letter from Cardinal Rigali, outlining its materials: a DVD, Liturgy Guide for 2009-2010, flyer, brochures, and Pro-Life Resources. Multicultural/Campesino

Nearly 400 children and young people prepared for their First Communion in programs offered at migrant camps and dairies over the summer. Many of the programs of preparation took place outside under trees and often with no chairs or the benefit of materials found in classrooms. In many of the programs, parents had Bible study or classes in doctrine within view of their children. Catechists came primarily from CEBs and prayer groups. The leaders of all the programs speak of their initiation in this ministry with Zeferino Gonzalez (+2006). Bishop Steinbock celebrated the Masses for First Communion in Merced and Lost Hills in July. The first Mass was held at the Merced Migrant Center on July 20. The camp was decorated for a festive occasion. Twenty-five children received their First Eucharist. A music group from Sacred Heart parish provided music for the liturgy. A wonderful meal was provided with carnitas and birria. On July 24 fifty children celebrated their First Eucharist at a migrant Mass at Lost Hills. The celebration included nearly five hundred people. The community prepared an elaborate altar that was elevated. The children and their Padrinos were beautifully organized and prepared for the liturgy.

The area was prepared as an outdoor church. Even the parking area was lined. In October, four camps celebrated First Eucharist in Our Lady of the Assumption in Caruthers. Three of the Masses were at the church and one in a camp. The beauty of these Masses is the tremendous display of devotion and faith of humble people who work hard in our fields. Several communities offer programs under direction of the office of Campesino ministry, and some are offered under the direction of parish religious education directors. We must commend those dedicated lay volunteers who prepare the children for the First Eucharist. They do an exceptional job with few resources under less than optimal conditions for their classes.

(www.40DaysFresno.org) once again joined the national pro-life outreach prayer campaign to end abortion, and completed a prayer initiative through parish and prayer group involvement. September 23 – November 1, 2009 40 Days have involved Prayer, Fasting and a Peaceful Vigil (outside the abortion facility at Fresno Planned Parenthood on North Fulton), and Community Outreach, spreading the message that life is sacred. Hopefully our parishes have also included the intention of 40 Days for Life in their other prayer forms, such as Adoration, Centering Prayer, saying the Rosary or charismatic prayer.

In an effort to share with those who have been touched by abortion that they are not alone, and that healing resources are available, Michalene Fredenburg champions Abortion Changes You Outreach, (www.abortionchangesyou.com). Michalene has also written a book, *CHANGED*, in which a variety of persons touched by abortion tell their powerful stories. The Diocese of Fresno supports a powerful healing resource in Rachel's Vineyard in English and Spanish. The faithful are generous in their support of these retreat experiences; however, we need to market Rachel's Vineyard more assertively, so it can reach many more in need.

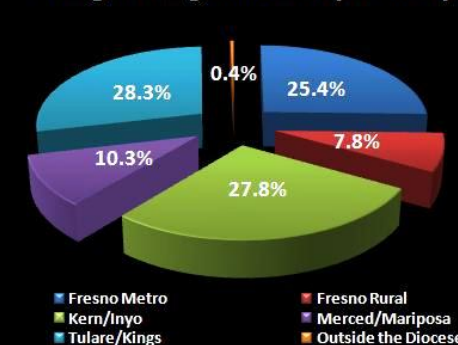

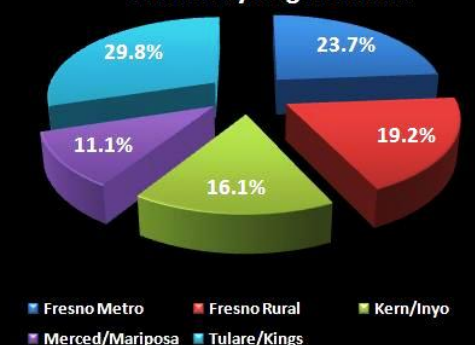

In 2000 the relics of St. Therese of Lisieux toured the US, including California. I was then commuting from the Valley into the Bay Area, and somehow I was never in the right place at the right time -- the closest I got was reading about it in the newspapers. Recently, some prison inmates in Britain got a lot closer.



The relics visited England and Wales in September and October, including her feast day, October 1st. On October 12, the relics rested in the chapel at Her Majesty's Prison (HMP)

Wormwood Scrubs for three hours. Known generally as "the Scrubs", the prison is the oldest in England, built in 1891 and houses more than 1200 medium security prisoners. About a quarter of them are Catholic. The Anglican chapel is larger than the Catholic chapel there, and was used to allow about a hundred inmates to attend. As Martha Linden of the British Press Association reported:

Under the eye of watchful prison officers in the magnificent surroundings of the wooden vaulted Anglican chapel in the prison, they sang Amazing Grace, read from the Bible and received Communion from the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Westminster, the Most Rev. Vincent Nichols.

During the Mass, two prisoners dressed in luminous work vests and jeans acted as altar servers, one dispensing incense so

vigorously throughout the chapel that the smoke alarms were activated twice. This visit was particularly appropriate as St. Therese would often pray for prisoners and she considered the pre-execution conversion of one prisoner God's answer to her prayer.

We in this diocese have ties to this event. This was the first diocese to have St. Therese for a patroness, and we now house more prisoners than any other diocese in the United States. Please continue to pray for all those affected by crime -- victims, offenders, those that love them and those that work with them.

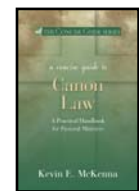

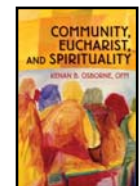

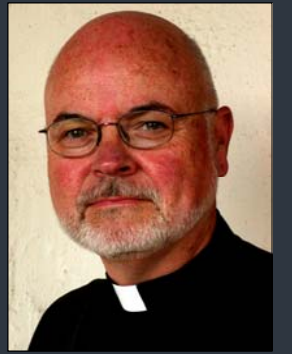

As the deadline for applying for *New Wine/Vino Nuevo* for the coming **Foundations** year passed (November 1st), we are making up the class schedule for the courses beginning in January and continuing through May, 2010. Sites have not yet been determined, but the opening day of Orientation will be held Saturday, January 9, 2010, at St. Anthony Retreat Center, Three Rivers. This day of prayer, introduction and overview of the planned three years of *New Wine/Vino Nuevo* will be led by Father David Norris and other teachers of the upcoming courses. Those who have already applied for the program and received their letter of confirmation should set aside this important date. Registration information and costs for this Orientation Day will be coming soon.

Already registered applicants have received by mail an info packet including a partial bibliography for the **Foundations** courses. A Catholic Study Bible, Catechism of the Catholic Church and the

Documents of Vatican II will be among the basic texts used throughout all the courses. In addition, individual teachers will assign required readings from course texts on scripture, theology, morality and human development and communication. The basic required texts used throughout the three-year program will be a four-part series called Understanding the Catechism: Creed, Prayer, Liturgy and Sacraments, Morality, published by RCL/Benziger. Also, Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord, the U.S Catholic bishops' document on lay ecclesial ministry published in 2005 will be a required reading for the course with that name. Another excellent text, Catholic Essentials by Michael Amodei, will be used for these basic introductory courses to our Catholic theology and ministry. These latter three required texts will be provided by the School of Ministry and their cost will be included in the registration fee. Other texts will be the responsibility of the students to purchase on-line or through a bookstore.

Social Justice

In the last Ministry Newsletter, I mentioned my work in the Fresno chapter of CPF, California People of Faith working against the death penalty. I said that we had had our first meeting in August and then I wrote that "indications are that our next meeting will be a lot larger." I was wrong! Our September meeting was *smaller*, not larger. My reaction: we have a lot of work to do. I wasn't depressed, but rather inspired to work harder. The Church is clear about its stand, Jesus is clear about his stand—we Catholics have to be clear about it as well.

At a deanery meeting, I asked the priests present what I might do to be more effective with my death penalty work and they suggested that I write some bulletin inserts for them, which I did.

Faith in Community, our Fresno PICO affiliate, has been working hard on our award's luncheon for November 7, when we will honor

three people who have worked hard for our community. One of those to be honored is our own Bishop John Steinbock. If you are interested in attending, you can contact me here at the Pastoral Center.

The biggest and best thing that has taken place this month was our Diocesan Congress. It was held this year at the Convention Center in Visalia and was simply superb! A load of people showed up and the day was full of activity and a sense of community. Saturday's Mass at noon was extraordinary, truly inspirational. I personally manned the Ministries table with Fr. David Norris for the day and met some wonderfully inspired people. I gave my talk on Social Justice in the late afternoon and was a bit worried beforehand about whether the people would be tired—but they definitely were not! I thoroughly enjoyed the session and have a feeling that most of my audience did too.

My hope when I give a talk or homily is that one person would be touched by what I am saying. One person would mean success. Well, after my talk I was chatting with some of the people, and a gentleman came up to me and said that he had been thinking about social justice for some time, trying to see how it all worked into his religious understanding, and then he told me that my talk made it all clear to him! Wow! I got the one person I needed. I was grateful to the Spirit who was obviously at work while I spoke. But there is still a lot for us to do.

Jesus came to live among us to bring us together as a community, as a people bonded in love, in His love. He gave his all to prove that to us. I pray that more and more of us see and respond to Jesus' invitation to us to be alive, fully alive.
